## HENRICI OCTAVI.

N THE PARLYAMENT begon  
at Westm, the. xxviii. of Appyll, the. xxxi. yere  
of the reyngne of the moste excellent, moste hygh, and  
mooste myghty pynce HENRY the eyghte, by the  
grace of GOD kyng of ENGLAND E and of  
FRAVNC E, defendour of the fayth, lozde of Ire-  
e, and in erthe vnder CHRIST E supreme head of the churche  
nglande, our most redoubted soueraine lozde, ther holden & after  
becontinued by dyuers prorogacions, vnto the. xi. day of Appyl  
e sayde yere. In the last session therof begon the same. xii. daye  
f Appyl, and from the same holden vnto the. xi. day of Maye,  
in the. xxxii. yere of his maiesties mooste prosperous reyngne,  
from the whiche it was by prorogacion contynued vntyll  
the. xxv. of the same moneth of May, and holden  
vntyll the. xxi. day of July, the sayd. xxxii.  
yere: At the whiche day the sayd parliament  
was by his gracie auctorite finished and  
dyssolued. Amonges manye other the  
actes folowynge by his highnesse,  
with thassent of the lozdes spi-  
rytuall and temporall, and  
the commons assembled  
in the sayde parlia-  
ment, haue bene  
establisched,  
ordene=ed  
and enacted.

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F I N I S T A B Y L A F.

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C	An acte howe by the kynges graunt, landes, tenementes, &c. may be by wylle, testament, or otherwyse disposed, and concerning waedes and pynner seasons.	Cap. i.
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**H**ERE THE KYNGES MOSTE roys all maestee in all the tyme of his mooste gracious and noble reigne hath euer ben mercifull louyng and benevolent and molte gracious souerayne loyde vnto all and singular his louyng and obedient subiectes, & by many tymes paste hach not onely shewed and imparted to them generally by hemany and often great and beneficall pardons heretofoze by autorites of his parlamenteis graunted, but also by dyuers other wapes and meanes many greate and ample grauntes and benignities, in such wyle as all his sayde subiectes ben moste bounden to the vtermoste of all theyz powers and graces by them receyued of god, to render and gyve vnto his maestee, theyz most humble reverence and obedient thankes and seruyces, with their dayly and continual prayeres to almyghty god for the continual preseruacion of his moste royll astate, in mooste kyngly honour and prosperite: yet all wapes his maestee beyng replete and endowed by god with grace goodnes and liberalite, moste tenderly considerynge, that his sayde obedient and louyng subiectes, can not vse or exercise them selues accozing to theyz estates degrees facultees and qualitees, or to bearre them selfes in such wyle, as that they may conveniently kepe and maynteyne theyz hospitalites and families, nor the good educations and byngynge vp of theyz lawfull generacions, whiche in this realme, laude be to god, is in all partes very great and abundant, but that in maner of necessite, as by dayly experiance is manifested and knownen, they shall not be able of theyz propredodes ratalles & other moueable substancialle to discharche theyz debtes, and after theyz degrees set forth and aduaunce theyz chyldyn and posteritez wherfore our sayde souerayne loyde moste vertuously considerynge the moatalte that is to every persone at goddes wyl and pleasure moste common and vncertayne, of his moste blessed dispisicion and lyberalite being wyllyng to releue and helpe his sayde subiectes in thair said necessitees, is contented and pleased, that it be ordeyned & enacted by autorite of this present parlamente in maner and forme as hereafter foloweth, that is to saye, that all and every persone and persones, hauyng or whiche hereafter shall haue any manours landes tenementes or hereditamentes holden in socage, or of the nature of socage tenure, and not haue yngynge any manours landes tenementes or hereditamentes holden of the kyng our souerayne loyde by knyghtes seruycie, or by socage tenure in chief, or of the nature of socage tenure in chife, nor of any other persone or persones by knyghtes seruycie, from the xx. day of July, in the yere of our lord M. C. And foxy, shall haue full and free libertee power and auocetees

sayde persone or personnes dothe dye: Than he vnto whom the sayd rente or fee ferme was due in fourme aforesayd, his executors and administratours, shal and may haue an action of dette agaynst the tenante in demeure, that oughte to haue payed the same, whan it fyre was due, his executors and administratours, and also distrapm for the same arrenges vpon the landes and tenementes, out of the whiche the sayd rentes or fees fermes were issyng and payable, in suchelyke maner and fourme as he oughte by myght haue done, if such person or persons, by whose deathe the aforesaid estate in the sayd rentes and fees fermes was determined and expired, had bene in full lyfe and not deade: And the awyng for the taking of the same distresse, to be made in maner and forme aforesayde.

**E**n act concerning precontractes of mariage and touchyng degrees of consanguinitie.

Cap. xxviii.

**V**E R E as heretofore the usurped power of the bishop of Rome, hache alwayes entangled and troubled the mere iurisdiction and regalle power of this realme of England, and also vnguered muche the subiectes of the same, by his usurped power in them, as by makynge that vnlawfull, whiche by goddes wrod is lawfull, both in mariage and other thinges, as hereafter shall appere at more lengthe, and tyl nowe of late in oure soueraygne lordes tyme, whiche is otherwys by lernynge taughte, than his predecessours in tymes past of longe tyme haue bene, hath so contynued the same, wherof yet some sparkes be leste, whiche hereafter might kyndell a greater fyre, and so remaynyng, his power not to seme vited exyncte: Therfore it is thought moste conueniente to the kynges highnesse, his lordes spypewall and temporal, with the commons of his realme assembled in this present parliament, that two thynges specially for this tyme be with diligencye prouided for, whereby many inconueniences haue enswed, and many mo elles mought enswe and folowe, as where heretofore dyuers and many personnes after longe continuances togyther in matrimony withoute any allegacion of ethyr of the parties, or any other at their mariage, why the same matrimony shulde not bee good iuste and lawfull and after the same matrimony solemnised and consummatte with carnall knowledge, and also somtyme fruite of chyldeyn ensud of the same mariage, haue neverthelesis by an vnust law of the bishop of Rome, whiche is, that vpon pretense of a formar contract made and not consummatte by carnall copulacion, for profe wherof two witnes by that lawe, were onely required, ben diuised and seperate, contrary to goddes law, and so the tred mariage both solemnised in the face of the churche, and consummatte with bodily knowledge, and confirmed also with the fruite of chyldeyn had betweene the, cleerly frustate and dissolved. Further also by reason of other poyntes then goddes law admitteth, for their lucre by that court inuented, the dispensacion wherof they alwayes reserved to them selues, as in kyngd of affinitie

affinitie betwene couisen germaynes, and so to fourth and fourth degree, car-  
sal knowledge of any of the same kynges or affinitie before in suche outward  
degrees, whiche els were laufull and be not prohibited by goddes lawe, and  
albeaute they wolde get money by it, and kepe a reputacion to theyz bluc-  
ketts jurisdiction, whereby not onely muche dilecione betwene laufull maried  
persones bath (contrary to goddes ordeneance) artisen much debate and suete  
at the law, with the wronghull vexacion and greate damage of the innocent  
party hath ben procured, and many lust mariage, broughte in doubt and  
daunger of vndoying, and also many tymes vndone, and laufull heires dis-  
heredit, wherof ther haue never elles, but soz his bayn glorioous blupacion  
ben moued any such question, syng freedom in them was geuen vs by god-  
des lawe, whiche ought to be most sure and certayn. But that notwithstanding  
marriages haue ben brought into suche an incertayne therby, that no  
marriage couide be so surely knitte and bounden, but it shuld lyne in ethyr of  
the parties power and arbitre, castyng away the feare of god, by meanes  
and compasses to proue a precontracte, a kynged, and allyaunce, or a carnall  
knowledge, to defeate the same: and so vnder the pretense of these allega-  
tions aforeshered, to lyue all the dayes of theyze lyfe in detestable adul-  
terie, to the vttre destruction of their owne soules, and the prouocacio of the  
tuble wrath of god, vpon the places where suche abhominationes were  
bida and suffered. Be it therfore enacted by the kyng our souerayne lord,  
the hylde spirituall and temporall and the commons in this presente par-  
lemente assembled and by autoritee of the same, that from the xvij<sup>th</sup> day of  
the moneth of Iuly next commyng, in the yere of our lord god a thousande  
þue hundred and fourtie, all and every suche mariage as within this  
realme of Englannde shall be contracted betwene lawefulle personnes, as  
by this acte we declare all personnes to be lawfull, that be not prohibited  
by goddes lawe to mary, suche mariage beinge contracte and solemnised  
in the face of the churche, and consummatte with bodily knowledge or fruite  
of chyldeyn, or childe, beyngh had therin betwene the parties so maried, shall  
be by autoritee of this present parliament aforesaid, denmed iudged and ta-  
ken to be lawful good iuste and indissoluble, not withstandyng any precon-  
tract or precontractes of matrimony, nor consummatte, with bodily know-  
ledg, which either of the persons so maried or both shal haue made with any  
other person or persons before the tyme of contractyng that mariage, which  
is idemnised and consummatte, or wherof such fruite is ensud or may ensue  
as aforesayde: and notwithstanding any dispensacion prescription lawe or other  
thyng geaunted or confirmed by acte or otherwise. And that no referua-  
tion or prohibicton, goddes lawe excepte, shall trouble or impeache any  
marriage without the leuitall degrees. And that no person, of what estate  
degree or condicione so ever he or she be, shall after the saide first dafe of the  
moneth of Iuly aforesayed, be admitted in any of the spirituall courses with-  
in this the kynges realme, or any his geaces other landes and dominions,  
to any process plea or allegation contrary to this foysated acte.

The
